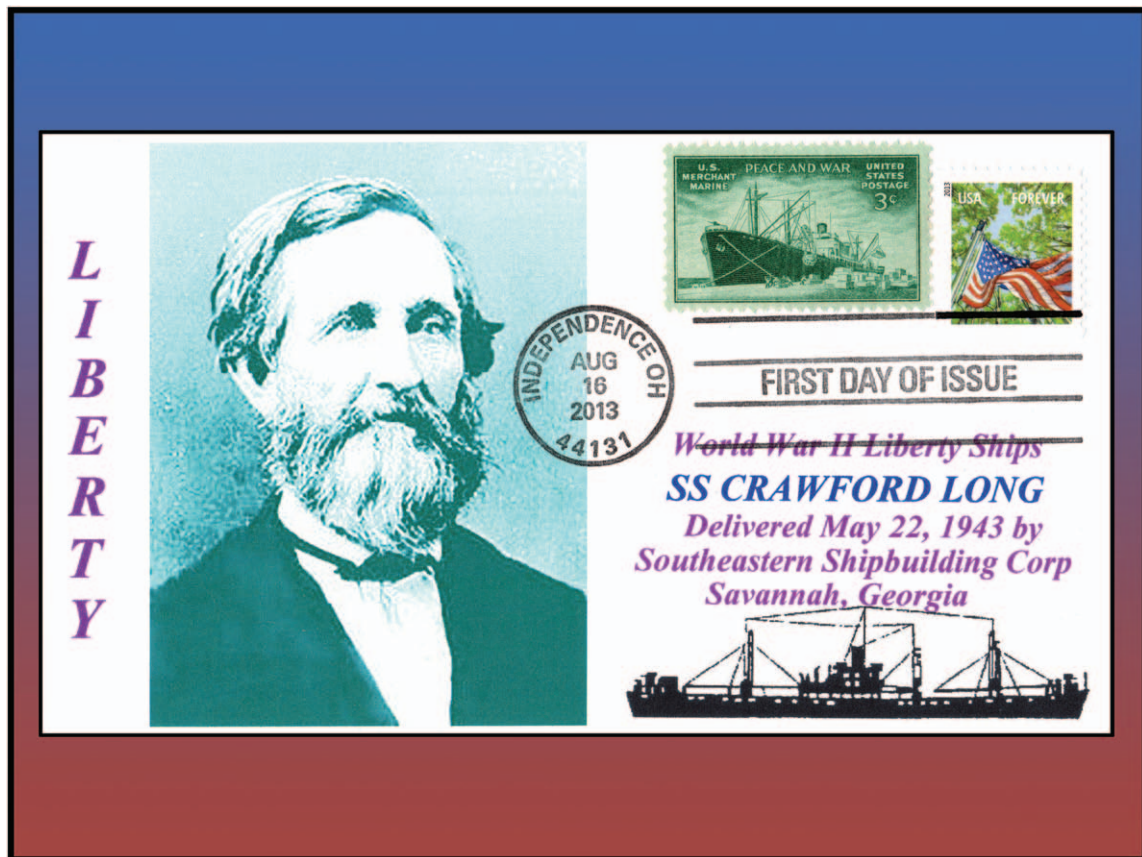

S. S. Crawford W. Long—From “Liberty” to Death



After quoting Patrick Henry's "Give me liberty or give me death," U.S. President Franklin Roosevelt promised that waves of newly built civilian "emergency cargo" ships would bring liberty to Europe. From 1941 to 1945, 18 American shipyards built a total of 2,710 of these, nicknamed "Liberty ships," each able to move over 10,000 tons of cargo and/or passengers. At Savannah's largest industry ever, the Southeastern Shipbuilding Corporation, the ninth of 88 "Libertys" built was the S.S. *Crawford W. Long* (lower right), named for Georgian ether pioneer Crawford Williamson Long, M.D. (left). The S.S. *Crawford W. Long* was delivered for wartime Merchant Marine service on May 22, 1943, just 142 days after its keel had been laid and less than a year before the fall of Berlin. Just 26 years after it was built for the Merchant Marine, the S.S. *Crawford W. Long* was scrapped in 1969. From "Liberty" to death: 1943–1969.
